The notion of elegance is probably the most subjective criterion there is. An enamelled watch from the seventeenth century and a sports watch from the twentieth century will be judged very differently by an enthusiast of antique horology. Inversely, a collector of diving watches will take a completely different view of a "bassine" or an "oignon" from the time of Louis XIV.

The degree of rarity, as well as the condition of cases, dials and movements, are more factual and tangible elements to assess.

Our opinions and expertise are therefore intended to be as neutral as possible and are based on over forty years' experience of the collector's horological market.
